Training Curriculum

Day 1: Understanding Behavior

Day 2: Etiology, Typology and Motivation of Sexual Offenses

Day 3: Supervision Strategies/ Case Studies/ Scenarios

Understanding Behaviors (Psycho-Ed)

Reviews the general concepts and theories of brain function, human behavior, behavioral etiology, Mental Health and personality disorders. The student will gain insight into offender behavior, personality types and disorders and how these factors relate to supervision.

Target Skills: Subject Knowledge, Case Framework

Etiology, Typology and Motivation of Sexual Offenses (Psycho-Ed)

Explores the typology, origins and motivations behind sexual offenses and their associated risk factors. Students will gain insight into the identification of risk related behaviors and patterns, paraphilias and practical application using the Containment Model.

Target Skills: Subject Knowledge, Case Framework, Insight/Discernment, Risk Identification

Supervision Strategies (Application)

Focuses on case management, court testimony, case framing and sanction/intervention application. Students will review SO specific treatment, use of the Containment Model, and case planning. In addition, students will gain insight into identifying and applying effective sanctions and interventions.

Target Skills: Objectivity, Professionalism, Policy Application, Case Planning

Case Studies and Scenarios (Skill Demonstration)

These mock case studies and scenarios are designed to reflect specific typologies and risk levels. Each case is embedded with information indicative of specific typology and risk factors. In these exercises, students will learn how to conduct a thorough review and assessment of case material, interpret assessments/reports, develop an effective case plan and explore potential sanctions and interventions that best address the identified risk behaviors.

- Interpreting and applying sex offender policies.
- Conducting SO risk assessments and identifying behavioral patterns linked to reoffending.
- Collaborating with treatment providers, polygraph examiners and other law enforcement agencies to enhance supervision effectiveness.
