ABOUT THE COURSE: This full day training **focuses on practical application of research for law enforcement on reducing secondary trauma**, which is often experienced by crime victims and survivors of sexual assault. The course introduces learners to trauma-informed approaches, creating awareness of the importance and nuances of trauma-informed responsive policing to build cooperation with crime victims — including in marginalized communities. This course integrates adult learning principles, models engagement strategies with participatory leadership values and strategies to build upon the expertise of the professional-level law enforcement officer.
